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50	RESOLVED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That this	
51	resolution may be cited as the "Sense of the Council in Opposition to Concealed Carry	
52 53	Reciprocity Resolution of 2017."	
54	Sec. 2. The Council finds that:	
55	(1) Every day in America, 315 people are shot and 93 people die from gun	
56	violence, including 7 children and teens.	
57	(2) Every year in America, 33,880 people die from gun violence, including	
58	11,564 murders and 21,037 suicides.	
59	(3) Countries around the world have dramatically reduced gun deaths by limiting	
60	access to firearms.	
61	(4) For every 1,000,000 people, there are about 105 firearms deaths per year in	
62	the United States, compared to only 9.3 in Australia, 2.3 in the United Kingdom, and 0.6 in	
63	Japan—all countries that have enacted strong gun control laws.	
64	(5) While the U.S. Supreme Court and the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District	
65	of Columbia Circuit have limited the District's ability to enact and maintain common sense gun	
66	control measures, the District still retains some of the strongest gun laws in the country.	
67	(6) H.R. 38 and S. 446 have been introduced in Congress, with the support of the	
68	National Rifle Association and President Donald Trump. If either of these bills become law, it	
69	would undermine local gun control legislation by allowing anyone who has a license to carry a	
70	concealed firearm in any state to carry a concealed firearm in every state, including the District	
71	of Columbia.	

72	(7) The U.S. Conference of Mayors, the American Bar Association, and cities
73	across the country have adopted resolutions opposing H.R. 38, S. 446, and similar legislation
74	before Congress due to the bills' deleterious impacts on public safety.
75	(8) H.R. 2909, the D.C. Personal Protection Reciprocity Act, was introduced in
76	the House of Representatives by Representative Thomas Massie on June 15, 2017, to specifically
77	impose concealed carry reciprocity on the District.
78	(9) The District has long suffered from the illegal transportation of firearms into
79	it from surrounding jurisdictions and remains particularly vulnerable to gun violence.
80	(10) Concealed carry reciprocity would dramatically increase the number of
81	firearms in the District, place unreasonable burdens on law enforcement, and harm public safety.
82	Sec. 3. It is the sense of the Council that members of Congress should oppose the
83	Concealed Carry Reciprocity Act and the D.C. Personal Protection Reciprocity Act and allow the
84	District and other jurisdictions to establish and maintain reasonable gun control measures that
85	reflect the needs of each jurisdiction and save lives.
86	Sec. 4. The Secretary to the Council shall transmit copies of this resolution, upon its
87	adoption, to the Mayor, the President and Vice President of the United States, the Speaker of the
