CRIME: Repeals Louisiana's "stand your ground" law

AN ACT

2 To repeal R.S. 14:19(C) and (D) and 20(C) and (D), relative to the justifiable use of force

3 or violence; to repeal statutory authorization providing for no duty to retreat when

4 a person is lawfully where they should be.

5 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:

6 Section 1. R.S. 14:19(C) and (D) and 20(C) and (D) are hereby repealed in their

Abstract: Repeals "stand your ground" provisions regarding justifiable homicide and the use of force or violence in defense.

<u>Present law</u> provides for justification for homicide and the use of force or violence in defense.

<u>Present law</u> further provides that a person who is not engaged in unlawful activity and who is in a place where he or she has a right to be shall have no duty to retreat before using force, violence, or deadly force, and may stand his or her ground and meet force with force.

<u>Present law</u> further provides that no finder of fact shall be permitted to consider the possibility of retreat as a factor in determining whether or not the person who used force, violence, or deadly force had a reasonable belief that the force was reasonable and apparently necessary to prevent a violent or forcible felony involving life or great bodily harm or to prevent the unlawful entry.

Proposed law repeals present law.
