## A BILL ENTITLED

### Court Personnel - Altering References From Master to Magistrate

- 3 FOR the purpose of altering references to the term "master" to "magistrate" in provisions 4 of law prohibiting certain individuals from practicing law or preparing or helping to prepare certain documents while employed in a certain capacity, in provisions 5 6 concerning the appointment and employment of circuit court personnel, in provisions 7 concerning the appointment, powers, and duties of juvenile court masters, in 8 provisions concerning mediation of certain matters, in provisions requiring oral 9 testimony in an action for alimony, annulment, or divorce, and in provisions relating 10 to the Judges' Retirement System; and generally relating to circuit court and juvenile 11 court masters.

- 1 (e) (1) There shall be included in the State budget for the Judicial Branch an appropriation to the Administrative Office of the Courts in the amount necessary to pay salaries and benefits of standing circuit court [masters] MAGISTRATES.
  - (2) The Administrative Office of the Courts shall:
- 5 (i) Identify the standing circuit court [masters] MAGISTRATES; and
- 6 (ii) Develop a personnel management plan and funding plan to 7 implement this subsection.
- 8 (3) A standing [master] MAGISTRATE of a circuit court or a judicial circuit shall report to and perform the duties and assignments determined by the judges of the respective circuit court or circuit, in accordance with the statewide policy on [masters] MAGISTRATES.
- 12 (4) The Court of Appeals may adopt rules concerning the [master] 13 MAGISTRATE positions described in this subsection.
- 14 (5) (i) Except as otherwise provided in this paragraph, circuit court 15 [masters] MAGISTRATES identified under paragraph (2) of this subsection shall remain 16 county or Baltimore City employees and shall not be State employees.
- 17 (ii) A circuit court [master] MAGISTRATE identified under 18 paragraph (2) of this subsection may elect to become a State employee between January 1, 19 2002, and March 31, 2002, both inclusive.
- 20 (iii) A circuit court [master] MAGISTRATE who elects under this 21 subsection to become a State employee shall become a State employee on July 1, 2002.
- 22 (iv) A standing circuit court [master] MAGISTRATE hired on or after 23 July 1, 2002, shall be a State employee.

- 25 (a) (1) The judges of a circuit court may not appoint a [master] MAGISTRATE 26 for juvenile causes arising under this subtitle and Subtitle 8A of this title unless the 27 appointment and the appointee are approved by the Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals.
- 28 (2) The standards expressed in § 3–806(b) of this subtitle, with respect to the assignment of judges, are applicable to the appointment of [masters] MAGISTRATES.
- 30 (3) A [master] MAGISTRATE, at the time of appointment and at all times 31 while serving as a [master] MAGISTRATE, shall be a member in good standing of the 32 Maryland Bar.

- 1 (b) (1) A [master] MAGISTRATE appointed for juvenile causes may conduct 2 hearings.
- 3 (2) Each proceeding shall be recorded, and the [master] MAGISTRATE shall make findings of fact, conclusions of law, and recommendations as to an appropriate order.
- 6 (3) The proposals and recommendations shall be in writing, and, within 10 days after the hearing, the original shall be filed with the court and a copy served on each party to the proceeding.
- 9 (c) (1) Any party, in accordance with the Maryland Rules, may file written exceptions to any or all of the [master's] MAGISTRATE'S findings, conclusions, and recommendations, but shall specify those items to which the party objects.
- 12 (2) The party who files exceptions may elect a hearing de novo or a hearing 13 on the record before the court unless the party is the State in proceedings involving juvenile 14 delinquency under Subtitle 8A of this title.
- 15 (3) If the State is the excepting party in proceedings involving juvenile 16 delinquency, the hearing shall be on the record, supplemented by additional evidence as 17 the judge considers relevant and to which the parties raise no objection.
- 18 (4) In either case, the hearing shall be limited to those matters to which exceptions have been taken.
- 20 (d) (1) The proposals and recommendations of a [master] MAGISTRATE for 21 juvenile causes do not constitute orders or final action of the court.
- 22 (2) The proposals and recommendations shall be promptly reviewed by the 23 court, and, in the absence of timely and proper exceptions, they may be adopted by the court 24 and appropriate orders entered based on them.
- 25 (3) Detention, community detention, or shelter care may be ordered by a 26 [master] MAGISTRATE pending court review of the [master's] MAGISTRATE'S findings, 27 conclusions, and recommendations.
- 28 (e) If the court, on its own motion and in the absence of timely and proper exceptions, decides not to adopt the [master's] MAGISTRATE'S findings, conclusions, and recommendations, or any of them, the court shall conduct a de novo hearing, unless all parties and the court agree to a hearing on the record.
