AN ACT

To amend chapter 571, RSMo, by adding thereto two new sections relating to the purchasing of firearms, with penalty provisions.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Chapter 571, RSMo, is amended by adding thereto two new 2 sections, to be known as sections 571.600 and 571.610, to read as follows:

571.600. It is the intention of the general assembly of the state of

- 2 Missouri to grant the right to life to all humans and to regulate
- 3 firearms to the full extent permitted by the Constitution of the United
- 4 States, decisions of the United States Supreme Court, and federal
- 5 statutes.

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- 571.610. 1. No firearms shall be purchased without voluntary and
- ? informed consent, purchased freely and of sound mental state. A
- 3 purchaser's decision shall be considered voluntary and informed and
- 4 purchased freely and of sound mental state if, and only if, at least
- 5 seventy-two hours prior to the purchase:
 - (1) The purchaser is presented with information about:
- 7 (a) The immediate and long-term medical risks associated with
- 8 the use of firearms including, but not limited to, accidental injury to
- 9 oneself or another, accidental death to any person, intentional injury
- 10 to oneself or another, intentional death to any person, and possible
- 11 adverse psychological effects associated with the above risks
- 12 associated;
- 13 (b) The anatomical and physiological characteristics of those
- 14 harmed by firearms at the time of their usage; and
- 15 (c) The immediate and long-term medical risks to those harmed
- 16 by firearms, in light of the accidental or intentional harm they may

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17 cause to any person;

- (2) The seller who is to sell the firearm has presented the purchaser, in person, printed materials provided by the department of public safety, which describe the probable anatomical and lifestyle characteristics of the persons harmed by firearm violence at two-year increments from time of harm suffered to an average American life expectancy, including color photographs or images of those harmed by firearm violence. Such descriptions shall include information about the total loss of life in the United States due to firearm violence, victim impact statements, information regarding the families of those lost and harmed by firearm violence and information on alternatives to firearms. The printed materials shall prominently display the following statement: "The life of each human being matters. Firearms may terminate the life of a separate, unique, living human being.";
- (3) The seller who is to sell the firearm shall provide the purchaser with the opportunity to view at least seventy-two hours prior to the purchase a firearm victim impact panel and hear the testimony of those harmed by firearm violence. The purchaser shall be provided with a geographically indexed list of places maintained by the department of public safety where a firearm has contributed to loss of life or any harm to any person.
- 2. All information required to be provided to a person considering purchasing a firearm under subsection 1 of this section shall be presented to the purchaser individually, in the physical presence of the purchaser, and in a private room, to protect their privacy, to maintain the confidentiality of their decision, to ensure that the information focuses on their individual circumstances, to ensure he or she has an adequate opportunity to ask questions, and to ensure that he or she is in a sound mental state. Should a purchaser be unable to read materials provided to him or her, the materials shall be read to the purchaser by the seller. Should a purchaser need an interpreter to understand the information presented in the written materials, an interpreter shall be provided to the purchaser. Should a purchaser ask questions concerning any of the information or materials, answers shall be provided in a language he or she can understand.
- 3. No firearm shall be purchased unless and until the purchaser certifies in writing on a checklist form provided by the department of

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public safety that he or she has been presented all the information required in subsection 1 of this section, that he or she has been provided the opportunity to view photos of the potential effects of firearms, witness a victim impact panel and hear the testimony of those affected by firearms violence, and that he or she further certifies that he or she purchases the firearm with voluntary and informed consent and purchases freely and of sound mental state.

- 4. No seller shall sell a firearm to a purchaser unless and until the seller has received a signed copy of the form prescribed in subsection 3 of this section. The seller shall retain a copy of the form for their records.
- 5. Any seller who violates any provision of this section shall be guilty of a class D felony.
- 6. A purchaser of firearms shall satisfy the background check requirements administered by the state highway patrol under section 43.543 and shall not have been adjudged mentally incompetent for ten years prior to application, or has not been committed to a mental health facility, as defined in section 632.005, or a similar institution located in another state.

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
