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10	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
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12	Section 1. Section 39-51-2111, MCA, is amended to read:
13	"39-51-2111. Unemployment benefits for victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking.
14	(1) (a) An individual who is otherwise eligible for benefits may not be denied benefits because the individual left
15	work or was discharged because of circumstances resulting from the individual or a child of the individual being
16	a victim of domestic violence, a sexual assault, or stalking or the individual left work or was discharged because
17	of an attempt on the individual's part to protect the individual or the individual's child from domestic abuse, a
18	sexual assault, or stalking.
19	(b) The account of an employer with an experience rating as provided in 39-51-1213 may not be charged
20	for the payment of benefits to an individual who left work or was discharged because of circumstances resulting
21	from domestic violence, a sexual assault, or stalking as provided for in subsection (1)(a).
22	(c) An individual may not receive more than 28 weeks of unemployment benefits for the 12-month period
23	after filing a claim under the provisions of this section. The provisions of this section do not affect the rights of an
24	individual to receive unemployment insurance benefits that the individual is entitled to under other provisions of
25	state law.
26	(2) For the purposes of subsection (1), an individual must be treated as being a victim of domestic
27	violence, a sexual assault, or stalking if the individual provides one or more of the following:
28	(a) an order of protection or other documentation of equitable relief issued by a court of competent
29	jurisdiction;
30	(b) a police record documenting the domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking;

1	(c) medical documentation of domestic violence or a sexual assault; or
2	(d) other documentation or certification of domestic violence, a sexual assault, or stalking provided by
3	a social worker, clergy member, shelter worker, or professional person, as defined in 53-21-102, who has
4	assisted the individual in dealing with domestic violence, a sexual assault, or stalking.
5	(3) An individual who is otherwise eligible for benefits under this section becomes ineligible if the
6	individual remains in or returns to the abusive situation that caused the individual to leave work or be discharged.
7	(4) The department shall provide a report to the legislature, as provided in 5-11-210, regarding the
8	benefits applied for and granted under this section, including a summary of the demographics of applicants for
9	and recipients of the benefits and the average and total cost of benefits provided.
10	(5) For the purposes of this section:
11	(a) "domestic violence" means the physical, mental, or emotional abuse of an individual or the individual's
12	child by a person with whom that individual or the individual's child lives or has recently lived;
13	(b) "sexual assault" means sexual assault as described in 45-5-502, sexual intercourse without consent
14	as described in 45-5-503, incest as described in 45-5-507, or sexual abuse of children and child pornography as
15	described in 45-5-625; and
16	(c) "stalking" has the meaning provided in 45-5-220."
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18	Section 2. Section 40-4-219, MCA, is amended to read:
19	"40-4-219. Amendment of parenting plan mediation. (1) The court may in its discretion amend a
20	prior parenting plan if it finds, upon the basis of facts that have arisen since the prior plan or that were unknown
21	to the court at the time of entry of the prior plan, that a change has occurred in the circumstances of the child and
22	that the amendment is necessary to serve the best interest of the child. In determining the child's best interest
23	under this section, the court may, in addition to the criteria in 40-4-212, also consider whether:
24	(a) the parents agree to the amendment;
25	(b) the child has been integrated into the family of the petitioner with consent of the parents;
26	(c) the child is 14 years of age or older and desires the amendment;
27	(d) one parent has willfully and consistently:
28	(i) refused to allow the child to have any contact with the other parent; or
29	(ii) attempted to frustrate or deny contact with the child by the other parent; or
30	(e) one parent has changed or intends to change the child's residence in a manner that significantly

affects the child's contact with the other parent. 1 2 (2) A court may modify a de facto parenting arrangement in accordance with the factors set forth in 3 40-4-212. 4 (3) The court shall presume a parent is not acting in the child's best interest if the parent does any of the 5 acts specified in subsection (1)(d) or (8). 6 (4) The court may amend the prior parenting plan based on subsection (1)(e) to provide a new residential 7 schedule for parental contact with the child and to apportion transportation costs between the parents. 8 (5) Attorney fees and costs must be assessed against a party seeking frivolous or repeated amendment 9 if the court finds that the amendment action is vexatious and constitutes harassment. 10 (6) A parenting plan may be amended pursuant to 40-4-221 upon the death of one parent. 11 (7) As used in this section, "prior parenting plan" means a parenting determination contained in a judicial 12 decree or order made in a parenting proceeding. In proceedings for amendment under this section, a proposed 13 amended parenting plan must be filed and served with the motion for amendment and with the response to the 14 motion for amendment. Preference must be given to carrying out the parenting plan. 15 (8) (a) If a parent or other person residing in that parent's household has been convicted of any of the 16 crimes listed in subsection (8)(b), the other parent or any other person who has been granted rights to the child 17 pursuant to court order may file an objection to the current parenting order with the court. The parent or other 18 person having rights to the child pursuant to court order shall give notice to the other parent of the objection as 19 provided by the Montana Rules of Civil Procedure, and the other parent has 21 days from the notice to respond. 20 If the parent who receives notice of objection fails to respond within 21 days, the parenting rights of that parent 21 are suspended until further order of the court. If that parent responds and objects, a hearing must be held within 22 30 days of the response. 23 (b) This subsection (8) applies to the following crimes: 24 (i) deliberate homicide, as described in 45-5-102; 25 (ii) mitigated deliberate homicide, as described in 45-5-103; 26 (iii) sexual assault, as described in 45-5-502; 27 (iv) sexual intercourse without consent, as described in 45-5-503; 28 (v) deviate sexual conduct with an animal, as described in 45-2-101 and prohibited under 45-8-218; 29 (vi) incest, as described in 45-5-507; 30 (vii) aggravated promotion of prostitution of a child, as described in 45-5-603(1)(b);



1 (viii) endangering the welfare of children, as described in 45-5-622; 2 (ix) partner or family member assault of the type described in 45-5-206(1)(a); 3 (x) sexual abuse of children and child pornography, as described in 45-5-625; and 4 (xi) strangulation of a partner or family member, as described in 45-5-215. 5 (9) Except in cases of physical, sexual, or emotional abuse or threat of physical, sexual, or emotional 6 abuse by one parent against the other parent or the child or when a parent has been convicted of a crime 7 enumerated in subsection (8)(b), the court may, in its discretion, order the parties to participate in a dispute 8 resolution process to assist in resolving any conflicts between the parties regarding amendment of the parenting 9 plan. The dispute resolution process may include counseling or mediation by a specified person or agency, and 10 court action. 11 (10) (a) Except as provided in subsection (10)(b), a court-ordered or de facto modification of a parenting 12 plan based in whole or in part on military service orders of a parent is temporary and reverts to the previous 13 parenting plan at the end of the military service. If a motion for an amendment of a parenting plan is filed after a parent returns from military service, the court may not consider a parent's absence due to that military service 14 15 in its determination of the best interest of the child. (b) A parent who has performed or is performing military service, as defined in 10-1-1003, may consent 16 17 to a temporary or permanent modification of a parenting plan: 18 (i) for the duration of the military service; or 19 (ii) that continues past the end of the military service." 20 21 SECTION 3. SECTION 40-15-116, MCA, IS AMENDED TO READ: 22 **"40-15-116. Definitions.** As used in 40-15-115 through 40-15-121, the following definitions apply: 23 (1) "Applicant" means a victim and includes a parent or guardian who acts on behalf of a victim. 24 (2) "Department" means the department of justice. 25 (3)"Participant" means an applicant who has submitted an application pursuant to 40-15-117 that has 26 been approved by the department. 27 (4) "Partner or family member assault" has the meaning provided in 45-5-206. 28 (5) "Sexual assault" means sexual assault as defined in 45-5-502, sexual intercourse without consent 29 as defined in 45-5-503, incest as defined in 45-5-507, or sexual abuse of children and child pornography as 30 defined in 45-5-625.

1	(6) "Stalking" has the meaning provided in 45-5-220.
2	(7) "Victim" means an individual who has been a victim of partner or family member assault, sexual
3	assault, or stalking or who is otherwise eligible to file a petition for an order of protection under 40-15-102."
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5	Section 4. Section 41-3-102, MCA, is amended to read:
6	"41-3-102. Definitions. As used in this chapter, the following definitions apply:
7	(1) (a) "Abandon", "abandoned", and "abandonment" mean:
8	(i) leaving a child under circumstances that make reasonable the belief that the parent does not intend
9	to resume care of the child in the future;
10	(ii) willfully surrendering physical custody for a period of 6 months and during that period not manifesting
11	to the child and the person having physical custody of the child a firm intention to resume physical custody or to
12	make permanent legal arrangements for the care of the child;
13	(iii) that the parent is unknown and has been unknown for a period of 90 days and that reasonable efforts
14	to identify and locate the parent have failed; or
15	(iv) the voluntary surrender, as defined in 40-6-402, by a parent of a newborn who is no more than 30
16	days old to an emergency services provider, as defined in 40-6-402.
17	(b) The terms do not include the voluntary surrender of a child to the department solely because of
18	parental inability to access publicly funded services.
19	(2) "A person responsible for a child's welfare" means:
20	(a) the child's parent, guardian, or foster parent or an adult who resides in the same home in which the
21	child resides;
22	(b) a person providing care in a day-care facility;
23	(c) an employee of a public or private residential institution, facility, home, or agency; or
24	(d) any other person responsible for the child's welfare in a residential setting.
25	(3) "Abused or neglected" means the state or condition of a child who has suffered child abuse or
26	neglect.
27	(4) (a) "Adequate health care" means any medical care or nonmedical remedial health care recognized
28	by an insurer licensed to provide disability insurance under Title 33, including the prevention of the withholding
29	of medically indicated treatment or medically indicated psychological care permitted or authorized under state
30	law.

(b) This chapter may not be construed to require or justify a finding of child abuse or neglect for the sole 1 2 reason that a parent or legal guardian, because of religious beliefs, does not provide adequate health care for 3 a child. However, this chapter may not be construed to limit the administrative or judicial authority of the state to 4 ensure that medical care is provided to the child when there is imminent substantial risk of serious harm to the 5 child. 6 (5) "Best interests of the child" means the physical, mental, and psychological conditions and needs of 7 the child and any other factor considered by the court to be relevant to the child. 8 (6) "Child" or "youth" means any person under 18 years of age. 9 (7) (a) "Child abuse or neglect" means: 10 (i) actual physical or psychological harm to a child; 11 (ii) substantial risk of physical or psychological harm to a child; or 12 (iii) abandonment. 13 (b) (i) The term includes: 14 (A) actual physical or psychological harm to a child or substantial risk of physical or psychological harm 15 to a child by the acts or omissions of a person responsible for the child's welfare; or 16 (B) exposing a child to the criminal distribution of dangerous drugs, as prohibited by 45-9-101, the 17 criminal production or manufacture of dangerous drugs, as prohibited by 45-9-110, or the operation of an unlawful 18 clandestine laboratory, as prohibited by 45-9-132. 19 (ii) For the purposes of this subsection (7), "dangerous drugs" means the compounds and substances 20 described as dangerous drugs in Schedules I through IV in Title 50, chapter 32, part 2. 21 (c) In proceedings under this chapter in which the federal Indian Child Welfare Act is applicable, this term 22 has the same meaning as "serious emotional or physical damage to the child" as used in 25 U.S.C. 1912(f). 23 (d) The term does not include self-defense, defense of others, or action taken to prevent the child from 24 self-harm that does not constitute physical or psychological harm to a child. 25 (8) "Concurrent planning" means to work toward reunification of the child with the family while at the 26 same time developing and implementing an alternative permanent plan. 27 (9) "Department" means the department of public health and human services provided for in 2-15-2201. 28 (10) "Family group decisionmaking meeting" means a meeting that involves family members in either 29 developing treatment plans or making placement decisions, or both. 30 (11) "Indian child" means any unmarried person who is under 18 years of age and who is either:

1	(a) a member of an Indian tribe; or
2	(b) eligible for membership in an Indian tribe and is the biological child of a member of an Indian tribe.
3	(12) "Indian child's tribe" means:
4	(a) the Indian tribe in which an Indian child is a member or eligible for membership; or
5	(b) in the case of an Indian child who is a member of or eligible for membership in more than one Indian
6	tribe, the Indian tribe with which the Indian child has the more significant contacts.
7	(13) "Indian custodian" means any Indian person who has legal custody of an Indian child under tribal
8	law or custom or under state law or to whom temporary physical care, custody, and control have been transferred
9	by the child's parent.
10	(14) "Indian tribe" means any Indian tribe, band, nation, or other organized group or community of Indians
11	recognized by:
12	(a) the state of Montana; or
13	(b) the United States secretary of the interior as being eligible for the services provided to Indians or
14	because of the group's status as Indians, including any Alaskan native village as defined in federal law.
15	(15) "Limited emancipation" means a status conferred on a youth by a court in accordance with 41-1-503
16	under which the youth is entitled to exercise some but not all of the rights and responsibilities of a person who
17	is 18 years of age or older.
18	(16) "Parent" means a biological or adoptive parent or stepparent.
19	(17) "Parent-child legal relationship" means the legal relationship that exists between a child and the
20	child's birth or adoptive parents, as provided in Title 40, chapter 6, part 2, unless the relationship has been
21	terminated by competent judicial decree as provided in 40-6-234, Title 42, or part 6 of this chapter.
22	(18) "Permanent placement" means reunification of the child with the child's parent, adoption, placement
23	with a legal guardian, placement with a fit and willing relative, or placement in another planned permanent living
24	arrangement until the child reaches 18 years of age.
25	(19) "Physical abuse" means an intentional act, an intentional omission, or gross negligence resulting
26	in substantial skin bruising, internal bleeding, substantial injury to skin, subdural hematoma, burns, bone
27	fractures, extreme pain, permanent or temporary disfigurement, impairment of any bodily organ or function, or
28	death.
29	(20) "Physical neglect" means either failure to provide basic necessities, including but not limited to
30	appropriate and adequate nutrition, protective shelter from the elements, and appropriate clothing related to

weather conditions, or failure to provide cleanliness and general supervision, or both, or exposing or allowing the 1 2 child to be exposed to an unreasonable physical or psychological risk to the child. 3 (21) (a) "Physical or psychological harm to a child" means the harm that occurs whenever the parent or 4 other person responsible for the child's welfare: 5 (i) inflicts or allows to be inflicted upon the child physical abuse, physical neglect, or psychological abuse 6 or neglect; 7 (ii) commits or allows sexual abuse or exploitation of the child; 8 (iii) induces or attempts to induce a child to give untrue testimony that the child or another child was 9 abused or neglected by a parent or other person responsible for the child's welfare; 10 (iv) causes malnutrition or a failure to thrive or otherwise fails to supply the child with adequate food or 11 fails to supply clothing, shelter, education, or adequate health care, though financially able to do so or offered 12 financial or other reasonable means to do so; 13 (v) exposes or allows the child to be exposed to an unreasonable risk to the child's health or welfare by 14 failing to intervene or eliminate the risk; or 15 (vi) abandons the child. 16 (b) The term does not include a youth not receiving supervision solely because of parental inability to 17 control the youth's behavior. 18 (22) (a) "Protective services" means services provided by the department: 19 (i) to enable a child alleged to have been abused or neglected to remain safely in the home; 20 (ii) to enable a child alleged to have been abused or neglected who has been removed from the home 21 to safely return to the home; or 22 (iii) to achieve permanency for a child adjudicated as a youth in need of care when circumstances and 23 the best interests of the child prevent reunification with parents or a return to the home. 24 (b) The term includes emergency protective services provided pursuant to 41-3-301, voluntary protective 25 services provided pursuant to 41-3-302, and court-ordered protective services provided pursuant to parts 4 and 26 6 of this chapter. 27 (23) (a) "Psychological abuse or neglect" means severe maltreatment through acts or omissions that are 28 injurious to the child's emotional, intellectual, or psychological capacity to function, including the commission of 29 acts of violence against another person residing in the child's home. 30 (b) The term may not be construed to hold a victim responsible for failing to prevent the crime against



1	the victim.
2	(24) "Qualified expert witness" as used in cases involving an Indian child in proceedings subject to the
3	federal Indian Child Welfare Act means:
4	(a) a member of the Indian child's tribe who is recognized by the tribal community as knowledgeable in
5	tribal customs as they pertain to family organization and child-rearing practices;
6	(b) a lay expert witness who has substantial experience in the delivery of child and family services to
7	Indians and extensive knowledge of prevailing social and cultural standards and child-rearing practices within the
8	Indian child's tribe; or
9	(c) a professional person who has substantial education and experience in providing services to children
10	and families and who possesses significant knowledge of and experience with Indian culture, family structure,
11	and child-rearing practices in general.
12	(25) "Reasonable cause to suspect" means cause that would lead a reasonable person to believe that
13	child abuse or neglect may have occurred or is occurring, based on all the facts and circumstances known to the
14	person.
15	(26) "Residential setting" means an out-of-home placement where the child typically resides for longer
16	than 30 days for the purpose of receiving food, shelter, security, guidance, and, if necessary, treatment.
17	(27) (a) "Sexual abuse" means the commission of sexual assault, sexual intercourse without consent,
18	indecent exposure, sexual abuse, ritual abuse of a minor, or incest, as described in Title 45, chapter 5.
19	(b) Sexual abuse does not include any necessary touching of an infant's or toddler's genital area while
20	attending to the sanitary or health care needs of that infant or toddler by a parent or other person responsible for
21	the child's welfare.
22	(28) "Sexual exploitation" means allowing, permitting, or encouraging a child to engage in a prostitution
23	offense, as described in 45-5-601 through 45-5-603, or allowing, permitting, or encouraging sexual abuse of
24	children and child pornography as described in 45-5-625.
25	(29) (a) "Social worker" means an employee of the department who, before the employee's field
26	assignment, has been educated or trained in a program of social work or a related field that includes cognitive
27	and family systems treatment or who has equivalent verified experience or verified training in the investigation
28	of child abuse, neglect, and endangerment.
29	(b) This definition does not apply to any provision of this code that is not in this chapter.
30	(30) "Treatment plan" means a written agreement between the department and the parent or guardian

or a court order that includes action that must be taken to resolve the condition or conduct of the parent or 1 2 guardian that resulted in the need for protective services for the child. The treatment plan may involve court 3 services, the department, and other parties, if necessary, for protective services. 4 (31) "Unfounded" means that after an investigation, the investigating person has determined that the 5 reported abuse, neglect, or exploitation has not occurred. 6 (32) "Unsubstantiated" means that after an investigation, the investigator was unable to determine by a 7 preponderance of the evidence that the reported abuse, neglect, or exploitation has occurred. 8 (33) (a) "Withholding of medically indicated treatment" means the failure to respond to an infant's 9 life-threatening conditions by providing treatment, including appropriate nutrition, hydration, and medication, that, 10 in the treating physician's or physicians' reasonable medical judgment, will be most likely to be effective in ameliorating or correcting the conditions. 11 12 (b) The term does not include the failure to provide treatment, other than appropriate nutrition, hydration, 13 or medication, to an infant when, in the treating physician's or physicians' reasonable medical judgment: 14 (i) the infant is chronically and irreversibly comatose; 15 (ii) the provision of treatment would: 16 (A) merely prolong dying; 17 (B) not be effective in ameliorating or correcting all of the infant's life-threatening conditions; or 18 (C) otherwise be futile in terms of the survival of the infant; or 19 (iii) the provision of treatment would be virtually futile in terms of the survival of the infant and the 20 treatment itself under the circumstances would be inhumane. For purposes of this subsection (33), "infant" means 21 an infant less than 1 year of age or an infant 1 year of age or older who has been continuously hospitalized since 22 birth, who was born extremely prematurely, or who has a long-term disability. The reference to less than 1 year 23 of age may not be construed to imply that treatment should be changed or discontinued when an infant reaches 24 1 year of age or to affect or limit any existing protections available under state laws regarding medical neglect 25 of children 1 year of age or older. 26 (34) "Youth in need of care" means a youth who has been adjudicated or determined, after a hearing, 27 to be or to have been abused, neglected, or abandoned." 28 29 Section 5. Section 42-2-608, MCA, is amended to read: 30 "42-2-608. Finding of unfitness. (1) The court may terminate parental rights for purposes of making

1	a child available for adoption on the grounds of unfitness if:
2	(a) the court makes a determination that the parent has been judicially deprived of custody of the child
3	on account of abuse or neglect toward the child;
4	(b) the parent has willfully abandoned the child, as defined in 41-3-102, in Montana or in any other
5	jurisdiction of the United States;
6	(c) it is proven to the satisfaction of the court that the parent, if able, has not contributed to the support
7	of the child for an aggregate period of 1 year before the filling of a petition for adoption;
8	(d) it is proven to the satisfaction of the court that the parent is in violation of a court order to support
9	either the child that is the subject of the adoption proceedings or other children with the same birth mother;
10	(e) the parent has been found guilty by a court of competent jurisdiction of:
11	(i) aggravated assault on the adoptee, as provided in 45-5-202;
12	(ii) sexual assault on a child, as provided in 45-5-502;
13	(iii) sexual intercourse without consent, as provided in 45-5-503, if the victim was a child;
14	(iv) incest, as provided in 45-5-507, if the victim was a child;
15	(v) homicide of a child, as provided in 45-5-102 or 45-5-103;
16	(vi) sexual abuse of a child and child pornography, as provided in 45-5-625; or
17	(vii) ritual abuse of a minor, as provided in 45-5-627;
18	(f) the child has been maintained by a public or private children's institution, a charitable agency, a
19	licensed child-placing agency, or the department for a period of 1 year without the parent contributing to the
20	support of the child during that period, if able;
21	(g) a finding is made for a parent who is given proper notice of hearing:
22	(i) that the parent has been convicted of a crime of violence or of violating a restraining or protective
23	order; and
24	(ii) the facts of the crime or violation and the parent's behavior indicate that the parent is unfit to maintain
25	a relationship of parent and child with the child;
26	(h) a finding is made for a parent who is given proper notice of hearing and is a respondent to the petition
27	to terminate parental rights and:
28	(i) by a preponderance of the evidence, it is found that termination is in the best interests of the child;
29	and
30	(ii) upon clear and convincing evidence, it is found that one of the following grounds exists:

(A) if the child is not in the legal and physical custody of the other parent, that the respondent is not able or willing to promptly assume legal and physical custody of the child and to pay for the child's support in accordance with the respondent's financial means;

(B) if the child is in the legal and physical custody of the other parent and a stepparent who is the prospective adoptive parent, that the respondent is not able or willing to promptly establish and maintain contact

(C) placing the child in the respondent's legal and physical custody would pose a risk of substantial harm to the physical or psychological well-being of the child because the circumstances of the child's conception, the respondent's behavior during the mother's pregnancy or since the child's birth, or the respondent's behavior with respect to other children indicates that the respondent is unfit to maintain a relationship of parent and child with the child; or

(D) failure to terminate the relationship of parent and child would be detrimental to the child.

with the child and to pay for the child's support in accordance with the respondent's financial means;

(2) In making a determination under subsection (1)(h)(ii)(D), the court shall consider any relevant factor, including the respondent's efforts to obtain or maintain legal and physical custody of the child, the role of other persons in thwarting the respondent's efforts to assert parental rights, the respondent's ability to care for the child, the age of the child, the quality of any previous relationship between the respondent and the child and between the respondent and any other children, the duration and suitability of the child's present custodial environment, and the effect of a change of physical custody on the child."

Section 1. Section 45-5-503. MCA, is amended to read:

"45-5-503. Sexual intercourse without consent. (1) A person who knowingly has sexual intercourse with another person without consent or with another person who is incapable of consent commits the offense of sexual intercourse without consent. A person may not be convicted under this section based on the age of the person's spouse, as provided in 45-5-501(1)(b)(iv).

- (2) A person convicted of sexual intercourse without consent shall be punished by life imprisonment or by imprisonment in the state prison for a term of not more than 20 years and may be fined not more than \$50,000, except as provided in 46-18-219, 46-18-222, and subsections (3), (4), and (5) of this section.

As used in this part, the following definitions apply: 22 (1) (a) "Home" means the temporary or permanent residence of an offender consisting of the actual living (23 area approved by the supervising authority. 24 (b) When more than one residence or family are located on a single piece of property, the term does not 25 include the residence of any other person who is not part of the social unit formed by the offender's immediate 26 family. 27 (2) "Home arrest" means the use of a person's home for purposes of confinement and home arrest 28 procedures and conditions imposed under this part. It does not include intensive supervision by the department 29 of corrections. 30 (3) "Monitoring device" means an electronic device or apparatus capable of recording or transmitting

1 information concerning the offender's presence in or absence from the home. The device may include an 2 apparatus for testing the offender's breath for the presence of alcohol. A telephone alone is not a monitoring 3 device. (4) "Supervising authority" means: 4 5 (a) in the case of an adult felon, the department of corrections; 6 (b) in the case of an adult misdemeanant, a court-approved entity other than the department of 7 corrections; or 8 (c) in the case of a juvenile, the juvenile probation division of the youth court or any other person or entity 9 appointed by the court. 10 (5) "Violent felony offense" means deliberate homicide, mitigated deliberate homicide, negligent 11 homicide, aggravated assault, negligent vehicular assault, kidnapping, aggravated kidnapping, robbery, sexual 12 intercourse without consent, sexual abuse of children and child pornography, arson, aggravated burglary, escape, 13 any criminal attempt to commit an enumerated offense, or conviction as a persistent felony offender when the 14 offender has a felony conviction for any of the listed offenses within the 5-year period preceding the date of the 15 present conviction." 16 17 Section 14. with a developmental disability of the ownership, use, benefit, or possession of or interest in the person's money, 1 2 assets, or property; 3 (b) an act taken by a person who has the trust and confidence of an older person or a person with a 4 developmental disability to obtain control of or to divert to the advantage of another the ownership, use, benefit, 5 or possession of or interest in the person's money, assets, or property by means of deception, duress, menace, 6 fraud, undue influence, or intimidation with the intent or result of permanently depriving the older person or person 7 with a developmental disability of the ownership, use, benefit, or possession of or interest in the person's money, 8 assets, or property; 9 (c) the unreasonable use of an older person or a person with a developmental disability or of a power 10 of attorney, conservatorship, or guardianship with regard to an older person or a person with a developmental 11 disability done in the course of an offer or sale of insurance or securities in order to obtain control of or to divert 12 to the advantage of another the ownership, use, benefit, or possession of the person's money, assets, or property 13 by means of deception, duress, menace, fraud, undue influence, or intimidation with the intent or result of 14 permanently depriving the older person or person with a developmental disability of the ownership, use, benefit, 15 or possession of the person's money, assets, or property. 16 (4) "Incapacitated person" has the meaning given in 72-5-101. 17 (5) "Long-term care facility" means a facility defined in 50-5-101. 18 (6) "Mental injury" means an identifiable and substantial impairment of a person's intellectual or 19 psychological functioning or well-being. 20 (7) "Neglect" means the failure of a person who has assumed legal responsibility or a contractual 21 obligation for caring for an older person or a person with a developmental disability or who has voluntarily 22 assumed responsibility for the person's care, including an employee of a public or private residential institution, 23 facility, home, or agency, to provide food, shelter, clothing, or services necessary to maintain the physical or 24 mental health of the older person or the person with a developmental disability. 25 (8) "Older person" means a person who is at least 60 years of age. 26 (9) "Person with a developmental disability" means a person 18 years of age or older who has a 27 developmental disability, as defined in 53-20-102. 28 (10) "Physical injury" means death, permanent or temporary disfigurement, or impairment of any bodily 29 organ or function. 30 (11) "Sexual abuse" means the commission of sexual assault, sexual intercourse without consent,

1 indecent exposure, deviate sexual conduct, incest, or sexual abuse of children and child pornography as

2 described in Title 45, chapter 5, part 5, and Title 45, chapter 8, part 2."
