A RESOLUTION

- Urging the Congress of the United States to amend the Controlled Substances Act to remove marijuana as a Schedule I controlled substance and to recognize the proven medical purposes of marijuana.

 WHEREAS, The Controlled Substances Act (Public Law 91-513, 84 Stat. 1236) was enacted by the 91st Congress and became effective May 1, 1970; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Schedule I drugs, substances or chemicals under the
- 9 Controlled Substances Act include controlled substances which
- 10 are found to have highly addictive properties, no currently
- 11 accepted medical use in the United States and a lack of accepted
- 12 safety for use of the drug under medical supervision; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Marijuana is listed as a Schedule I controlled
- 14 substance under the Controlled Substances Act, and there are no
- 15 exceptions in Federal law for marijuana purportedly used for
- 16 medicinal purposes even if the use is sanctioned by State law;
- 17 and
- 18 WHEREAS, An ongoing national debate as to the safety and
- 19 medical application of marijuana has led nearly 30 states,

- 1 including the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, to approve the use
- 2 of marijuana for treatment of certain medical conditions; and
- 3 WHEREAS, 18 U.S.C. § 922(g)(3) prohibits any person who is an
- 4 "unlawful user of or addicted to any controlled substance (as
- 5 defined in section 102 of the Controlled Substances Act (21
- 6 U.S.C. 802))" from shipping, transporting, receiving or
- 7 possessing firearms or ammunition; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Recent guidance from the United States Department of
- 9 Justice has reiterated marijuana's status as an illegal drug
- 10 under the Controlled Substances Act; and
- 11 WHEREAS, Current Federal law restricting possession of a
- 12 firearm by marijuana users in states which have legalized its
- 13 use creates contradictory legal standards; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Carving out a special exception for marijuana users
- 15 to own firearms while marijuana remains classified as a Schedule
- 16 I controlled substance would create special protections for some
- 17 federally illegal drug users while preserving restrictions on
- 18 others; and
- 19 WHEREAS, In order to create a cohesive and unified system
- 20 among the states, including states which have not legalized the
- 21 medical use of marijuana, the Federal Government must choose to
- 22 either ignore the prohibition on marijuana users owning firearms
- 23 or reschedule marijuana to permit its medical use; therefore be
- 24 it
- 25 RESOLVED, That the Senate of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 26 urge the Congress of the United States to amend the Controlled
- 27 Substances Act to remove marijuana as a Schedule I controlled
- 28 substance and to recognize the proven medical purposes of
- 29 marijuana; and be it further
- 30 RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to

- 1 the President of the United States, the presiding officers of
- 2 each house of Congress and to each member of Congress from
- 3 Pennsylvania.
