## ENGROSSED SECOND SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 2060

State of Washington 64th Legislature 2015 Regular Session

By House Appropriations (originally sponsored by Representatives Jinkins and Ormsby)

- AN ACT Relating to timeliness of competency evaluation 1 2 restoration services; amending RCW 10.77.068, 10.77.073, 10.77.086, 3 10.77.220, 71.05.235, and 10.77.065; reenacting 10.77.088, 4 amending RCW 10.77.065; creating a new section; providing 5 effective date; providing expiration dates; declaring and an 6 emergency.
- 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 8 **Sec. 1.** RCW 10.77.068 and 2012 c 256 s 2 are each amended to 9 read as follows:
- 10 The legislature establishes the following performance (1)(a) targets and maximum time limits for the timeliness of the completion 11 12 of accurate and reliable evaluations of competency to stand trial and 13 admissions for inpatient restoration services related to competency 14 to proceed or stand trial for adult criminal defendants. legislature recognizes that these targets may not be achievable in 15 16 all cases without compromise to the quality of competency evaluation 17 and restoration services, but intends for the department to manage, 18 allocate, and request appropriations for resources in order to meet these targets whenever possible without sacrificing the accuracy and 19 20 quality of competency evaluations and restorations, and to otherwise

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- 1 make sustainable improvements and track performance related to the 2 timeliness of competency services:
  - (i) For a state hospital to extend an offer of admission to a defendant in pretrial custody for legally authorized ((treatment or)) evaluation services related to competency, or to extend an offer of admission for legally authorized services following dismissal of charges based on ((incompetent)) incompetence to proceed or stand  $trial((\tau))$ :
    - (A) A performance target of seven days or less; and
  - (B) A maximum time limit of fourteen days;

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- 11 (ii) For a state hospital to extend an offer of admission to a
  12 defendant in pretrial custody for legally authorized inpatient
  13 restoration treatment related to competency:
  - (A) A performance target of seven days or less; and
  - (B) A maximum time limit of fourteen days;
- - (A) A performance target of seven days or less; and
- 20 <u>(B) A maximum time limit of fourteen days, plus an additional</u>
  21 <u>seven-day extension if needed for clinical reasons to complete the</u>
  22 evaluation at the determination of the department;
  - $((\frac{(iii)}{)})$  (iv) For completion of a competency evaluation in the community and distribution of the evaluation report for a defendant who is released from custody and makes a reasonable effort to cooperate with the evaluation, a performance target of twenty-one days or less.
- 28 (b) The time periods measured in these performance targets and 29 maximum time limits shall run from the date on which the state hospital receives the court referral and charging documents, 30 31 discovery, mental health and medical records, police reports, the 32 names and addresses of the attorneys for the defendant and state or county, the name of the judge ordering the evaluation, information 33 about the alleged crime, a summary of the reasons for the evaluation 34 request, and criminal history information related to the defendant. 35 36 The ((targets)) maximum time limits in (a)(((ti)) and (ti))) of this subsection shall be phased in over a ((six-month)) one-year period 37 38 ((from May 1, 2012. The target in (a)(iii) of this subsection shall 39 be phased in over a twelve-month period from May 1, 2012.

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- (c) The legislature recognizes the following nonexclusive list of circumstances that may place achievement of targets for completion of competency services described in (a) of this subsection out of the department's reach in an individual case without aspersion to the efforts of the department)) beginning July 1, 2015, in a manner that results in measurable incremental progress toward meeting the time limits over the course of the year.
- (c) It shall be a defense to an allegation that the department has exceeded the maximum time limits for completion of competency services described in (a) of this subsection if the department can demonstrate by a preponderance of the evidence that the reason for exceeding the maximum time limits was outside of the department's control including, but not limited to, the following circumstances:
- (i) Despite a timely request, the department has not received necessary medical clearance information regarding the current medical status of a defendant in pretrial custody for the purposes of admission to a state hospital;
- (ii) The individual circumstances of the defendant make accurate completion of an evaluation of competency to proceed or stand trial dependent upon review of medical history information which is in the custody of a third party and cannot be immediately obtained by the department. Completion of a competency evaluation shall not be postponed for procurement of medical history information which is merely supplementary to the competency determination;
- (iii) Completion of the referral is frustrated by lack of availability or participation by counsel, jail or court personnel, interpreters, or the defendant;
- 28 <u>(iv) The jail does not have access to appropriate private space</u>
  29 <u>to conduct a competency evaluation for a defendant in pretrial</u>
  30 custody;
- 31 <u>(v) The defendant asserts legal rights that result in a delay in</u> 32 <u>the provision of competency services;</u> or
  - ((<del>(iv)</del>)) <u>(vi)</u> An unusual spike in the receipt of evaluation referrals or in the number of defendants requiring restoration services has occurred, causing temporary delays until the unexpected excess demand for competency services can be resolved.
    - (2) The department shall:

(a) Develop, document, and implement procedures to monitor the clinical status of defendants admitted to a state hospital for competency services that allow the state hospital to accomplish early

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1 discharge for defendants for whom clinical objectives have been achieved or may be achieved before expiration of the commitment 2 3 period;

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- (b) Investigate the extent to which patients admitted to a state hospital under this chapter overstay time periods authorized by law and take reasonable steps to limit the time of commitment to authorized periods; and
- (c) Establish written standards for the productivity of forensic evaluators and utilize these standards to internally review the performance of forensic evaluators.
- (3) Following any quarter in which a state hospital has failed to meet one or more of the performance targets or maximum time limits in subsection (1) of this section after full implementation of the performance target or maximum time limit, the department shall report to the executive and the legislature the extent of this deviation and describe any corrective action being taken to improve performance. This report must be made publicly available. An average may be used to determine timeliness under this subsection.
- (4) Beginning December 1, 2013, the department shall report annually to the legislature and the executive on the timeliness of services related to competency to proceed or stand trial and the timeliness with which court referrals accompanied by charging documents, discovery, and criminal history information are provided to the department relative to the signature date of the court order. The report must be in a form that is accessible to the public and that breaks down performance by county.
- (5) This section does not create any new entitlement or cause of action related to the timeliness of competency evaluations admission for inpatient restoration services related to competency to proceed or stand trial, nor can it form the basis for contempt sanctions under chapter 7.21 RCW or a motion to dismiss criminal charges.
- Sec. 2. RCW 10.77.073 and 2013 c 284 s 1 are each amended to 33 34 read as follows:
- (1) The department shall reimburse a county for the cost of appointing a qualified expert or professional person under RCW 36 10.77.060(1)(a) subject to subsections (2), (3), and (4) of this 37 section if, at the time of a referral for an evaluation of competency to stand trial in a jail for an in-custody defendant, the department

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- ((has)): (a) During the most recent quarter, did not perform at least one-third of the number of jail-based competency evaluations for in-custody defendants as were performed by qualified experts or professional persons appointed by the court in the referring county; or (b) did not ((met)) meet the performance target for timely completion of competency evaluations under RCW 10.77.068(1)(a) ((<del>(ii)</del>)) (iii) during the most recent quarter in fifty percent of cases submitted by the referring county, as documented in the most recent quarterly report under RCW 10.77.068(3) or confirmed by maintained by the department((, the department shall reimburse the county for the cost of appointing a qualified expert or professional person under RCW 10.77.060(1)(a) subject to subsections (2) and (3) of this section)).
  - (2) Appointment of a qualified expert or professional person under this section must be from a list of qualified experts or professional persons assembled with participation by representatives of the prosecuting attorney and the defense bar of the county. The qualified expert or professional person shall complete an evaluation and report that includes the components specified in RCW 10.77.060(3).

- (3) The county shall provide a copy of the evaluation report to the applicable state hospital upon referral of the defendant for admission to the state hospital. The county shall maintain data on the timeliness of competency evaluations completed under this section.
- (4) A qualified expert or professional person appointed by a court under this section must be compensated for competency evaluations in an amount that will encourage in-depth evaluation reports. Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the department shall reimburse the county in an amount determined by the department to be fair and reasonable with the county paying any excess costs. The amount of reimbursement established by the department must at least meet the equivalent amount for evaluations conducted by the department.
- $((\frac{4)}{(5)}))$  (5) Nothing in this section precludes either party from objecting to the appointment of an evaluator on the basis that an inpatient evaluation is appropriate under RCW 10.77.060(1)(d).
- $((\frac{5}{(6)}))$  (6) This section expires June 30,  $(\frac{2016}{)}$  2018.

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NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. (1) The legislature finds that there are currently no alternatives to competency restoration provided in the state hospitals and there is insufficient capacity within the state hospitals to meet the projected service needs of the state. Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the legislature encourages the department of social and health services to develop, on a phased-in basis, alternative locations and increased access to competency restoration services under chapter 10.77 RCW for individuals who do not require inpatient psychiatric hospitalization level services.

- 11 (2) The department shall work with counties and the courts to
  12 develop a screening process to determine which individuals are safe
  13 to receive competency restoration treatment outside the state
  14 hospitals. The department also must develop a plan to sufficiently
  15 increase capacity to meet the projected ten-year need for both
  16 forensic and civil mental health bed demand.
- **Sec. 4.** RCW 10.77.086 and 2013 c 289 s 2 are each amended to 18 read as follows:
  - (1)(a) If the defendant is charged with a felony and determined to be incompetent, until he or she has regained the competency necessary to understand the proceedings against him or her and assist in his or her own defense, ((or has been determined unlikely to regain competency pursuant to RCW 10.77.084(1)(b),)) but in any event for a period of no longer than ninety days, the court:
  - (i) Shall commit the defendant to the custody of the secretary who shall place such defendant in an appropriate facility of the department for evaluation and treatment; or
  - (ii) May alternatively order the defendant to undergo evaluation and treatment at some other facility as determined by the department, or under the guidance and control of a professional person. The facilities may include community mental health providers or other local facilities that contract with the department and are willing and able to provide treatment under this section. During the 2015-2017 fiscal biennium, the department may contract with one or more cities or counties to provide competency restoration services in a city or county jail if the city or county jail is willing and able to serve as a location for competency restoration services and if the secretary determines that there is an emergent need for beds and documents the justification, including a plan to address the

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emergency. Patients receiving competency restoration services in a city or county jail must be physically separated from other populations at the jail, must interact only with treatment staff and not jail staff, except for incidental interaction with jail staff for custodial service, food service, or similar services, and must be provided as much as possible with a therapeutic environment. Competency restoration services provided in a city or county jail must be performed by staff and professionals who have the skills and qualifications necessary to provide competency restoration services comparable to those provided at a state hospital. The ninety-day period for evaluation and treatment under this subsection (1) includes only the time the defendant is actually at the facility and is in addition to reasonable time for transport to or from the facility.

(b) For a defendant whose highest charge is a class C felony, or a class B felony that is not classified as violent under RCW 9.94A.030, the maximum time allowed for the initial period of commitment for competency restoration is forty-five days. The forty-five day period includes only the time the defendant is actually at the facility and is in addition to reasonable time for transport to or from the facility.

- (c) If the court determines that the defendant is unlikely to regain competency, the court may dismiss the charges without prejudice without ordering the defendant to undergo restoration treatment, in which case the court shall order that the defendant be referred for evaluation for civil commitment in the manner provided in subsection (4) of this section.
- (2) On or before expiration of the initial period of commitment under subsection (1) of this section the court shall conduct a hearing, at which it shall determine whether or not the defendant is incompetent.
- (3) If the court finds by a preponderance of the evidence that a defendant charged with a felony is incompetent, the court shall have the option of extending the order of commitment or alternative treatment for an additional period of ninety days, but the court must at the time of extension set a date for a prompt hearing to determine the defendant's competency before the expiration of the second restoration period. The defendant, the defendant's attorney, or the prosecutor has the right to demand that the hearing be before a jury. No extension shall be ordered for a second or third restoration

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period as provided in subsection (4) of this section if the defendant's incompetence has been determined by the secretary to be solely the result of a developmental disability which is such that competence is not reasonably likely to be regained during extension. The ninety-day period includes only the time the defendant is actually at the facility and is in addition to reasonable time for transport to or from the facility.

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- (4) For persons charged with a felony, at the hearing upon the 8 expiration of the second restoration period, or at the end of the 10 developmental disability, if the jury or court finds that the 11 12 defendant is incompetent, or if the court or jury at any stage finds that the defendant is incompetent and the court determines that the 13 defendant is unlikely to regain competency, the charges shall be 14 dismissed without prejudice, and the court shall order the defendant 15 be committed to a state hospital as defined in RCW 72.23.010 for up to seventy-two hours starting from admission to the facility, 17 excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays, for evaluation for the 18 purpose of filing a civil commitment petition under chapter 71.05 RCW. The criminal charges shall not be dismissed if the court or jury 21 finds that: (a) The defendant (i) is a substantial danger to other persons; or (ii) presents a substantial likelihood of committing 22 criminal acts jeopardizing public safety or security; and (b) there 23 a substantial probability that the defendant will regain 24 25 competency within a reasonable period of time. In the event that the 26 court or jury makes such a finding, the court may extend the period of commitment for up to an additional six months. The six-month 27 28 period includes only the time the defendant is actually at the facility and is in addition to reasonable time for transport to or from the facility.
- 31 **Sec. 5.** RCW 10.77.088 and 2007 c 375 s 5 are each amended to 32 read as follows:
  - (1)(a) If the defendant is charged with a nonfelony crime which is a serious offense as identified in RCW 10.77.092 and found by the court to be not competent, then the court ((shall order the secretary to place the defendant)):
- 37 (i) ((At a secure mental health facility in the custody of the department or an agency designated by the department for mental 38 39 health treatment and restoration of competency.)) Shall commit the

p. 8 E2SHB 2060 1 defendant to the custody of the secretary who shall place such defendant in an appropriate facility of the department for evaluation 3 and treatment;

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(ii) May alternatively order the defendant to undergo evaluation 4 and treatment at some other facility as determined by the department, 5 6 or under the guidance and control of a professional person. The facilities may include community mental health providers or other 7 local facilities that contract with the department and are willing 8 and able to provide treatment under this section. During the 9 10 2015-2017 fiscal biennium, the department may contract with one or more cities or counties to provide competency restoration services in 11 12 a city or county jail if the city or county jail is willing and able to serve as a location for competency restoration services and if the 13 secretary determines that there is an emergent need for beds and 14 documents the justification, including a plan to address the 15 emergency. The placement under (a)(i) and (ii) of this subsection shall not exceed fourteen days in addition to any unused time of the evaluation under RCW 10.77.060. The court shall compute this total period and include its computation in the order. The fourteen-day period plus any unused time of the evaluation under RCW 10.77.060 shall be considered to include only the time the defendant is actually at the facility and shall be in addition to reasonable time for transport to or from the facility;

((<del>(ii)</del>)) (iii) May alternatively order that the defendant be placed on conditional release for up to ninety days for mental health treatment and restoration of competency; or

((<del>(iii)</del>)) (iv) May order any combination of this subsection.

(b) If the court has determined that the defendant is unlikely to regain competency, the court may dismiss the charges without prejudice without ordering the defendant to undergo restoration

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treatment, in which case the court shall order that the defendant be referred for evaluation for civil commitment in the manner provided in (c) of this subsection.

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- (c)(i) If the proceedings are dismissed under RCW 10.77.084 and the defendant was on conditional release at the time of dismissal, the court shall order the designated mental health professional within that county to evaluate the defendant pursuant to chapter 71.05 RCW. The evaluation may be conducted in any location chosen by the professional.
- (ii) If the defendant was in custody and not on conditional 10 release at the time of dismissal, the defendant shall be detained and 11 12 sent to an evaluation and treatment facility for up to seventy-two hours, excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays, for evaluation for 13 purposes of filing a petition under chapter 71.05 RCW. The seventy-14 two-hour period shall commence upon the next nonholiday weekday 15 16 following the court order and shall run to the end of the last 17 nonholiday weekday within the seventy-two-hour period.
- 18 (2) If the defendant is charged with a nonfelony crime that is 19 not a serious offense as defined in RCW 10.77.092:
  - The court may stay or dismiss proceedings and detain the defendant for sufficient time to allow the designated mental health professional to evaluate the defendant and consider initial detention proceedings under chapter 71.05 RCW. The court must give notice to all parties at least twenty-four hours before the dismissal of any proceeding under this subsection, and provide an opportunity for a hearing on whether to dismiss the proceedings.
- 27 **Sec. 6.** RCW 10.77.220 and 1982 c 112 s 3 are each amended to 28 read as follows:
- No person who is criminally insane confined pursuant to this 29 30 chapter shall be incarcerated in a state correctional institution or facility: PROVIDED, That nothing herein shall prohibit confinement in 31 a mental health facility located wholly within a correctional 32 institution. Confinement of a person who is criminally insane in a 33 county jail or other local facility while awaiting either placement 34 35 in a treatment program or a court hearing pursuant to this chapter is permitted for no more than seven days. 36
- 37 **Sec. 7.** RCW 71.05.235 and 2008 c 213 s 5 are each amended to 38 read as follows:

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(1) If an individual is referred to a designated mental health professional under RCW 10.77.088(1)((\(\frac{(b+)}{b}\))) (c)(i), the designated mental health professional shall examine the individual within forty-eight hours. If the designated mental health professional determines it is not appropriate to detain the individual or petition for a ninety-day less restrictive alternative under RCW 71.05.230(4), that decision shall be immediately presented to the superior court for hearing. The court shall hold a hearing to consider the decision of the designated mental health professional not later than the next judicial day. At the hearing the superior court shall review the determination of the designated mental health professional and determine whether an order should be entered requiring the person to be evaluated at an evaluation and treatment facility. No person referred to an evaluation and treatment facility may be held at the facility longer than seventy-two hours.

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(2) If an individual is placed in an evaluation and treatment facility under RCW  $10.77.088(1)((\frac{b}{b}))$  (c)(ii), a professional person shall evaluate the individual for purposes of determining whether to file a ninety-day inpatient or outpatient petition under chapter 71.05 RCW. Before expiration of the seventy-two hour evaluation period authorized under RCW  $10.77.088(1)((\frac{b}{b}))$  (c)(ii), the professional person shall file a petition or, if the recommendation of the professional person is to release the individual, present his or her recommendation to the superior court of the county in which the criminal charge was dismissed. The superior court shall review the recommendation not later than forty-eight hours, excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays, after the recommendation is presented. If the court rejects the recommendation to unconditionally release the individual, the court may order the individual detained at a designated evaluation and treatment facility for not more than a seventy-two hour evaluation and treatment period and direct the individual to appear at a surety hearing before that court within seventy-two hours, or the court may release the individual but direct the individual to appear at a surety hearing set before that court within eleven days, at which time the prosecutor may file a petition under this chapter for ninety-day inpatient or outpatient treatment. If a petition is filed by the prosecutor, the court may order that the person named in the petition be detained at the evaluation and treatment facility that performed the evaluation under this subsection or order the respondent to be in outpatient treatment. If

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a petition is filed but the individual fails to appear in court for the surety hearing, the court shall order that a mental health professional or peace officer shall take such person or cause such person to be taken into custody and placed in an evaluation and treatment facility to be brought before the court the next judicial day after detention. Upon the individual's first appearance in court after a petition has been filed, proceedings under RCW 71.05.310 and 71.05.320 shall commence. For an individual subject to subsection, the prosecutor or professional person may directly file a petition for ninety-day inpatient or outpatient treatment and no petition for initial detention or fourteen-day detention is required before such a petition may be filed.

The court shall conduct the hearing on the petition filed under this subsection within five judicial days of the date the petition is filed. The court may continue the hearing upon the written request of the person named in the petition or the person's attorney, for good cause shown, which continuance shall not exceed five additional judicial days. If the person named in the petition requests a jury trial, the trial shall commence within ten judicial days of the date of the filing of the petition. The burden of proof shall be by clear, cogent, and convincing evidence and shall be upon the petitioner. The person shall be present at such proceeding, which shall in all respects accord with the constitutional guarantees of due process of law and the rules of evidence pursuant to RCW 71.05.360 (8) and (9).

During the proceeding the person named in the petition shall continue to be detained and treated until released by order of the court. If no order has been made within thirty days after the filing of the petition, not including any extensions of time requested by the detained person or his or her attorney, the detained person shall be released.

- (3) If a designated mental health professional or the professional person and prosecuting attorney for the county in which the criminal charge was dismissed or attorney general, as appropriate, stipulate that the individual does not present a likelihood of serious harm or is not gravely disabled, the hearing under this section is not required and the individual, if in custody, shall be released.
- 38 (4) The individual shall have the rights specified in RCW 71.05.360 (8) and (9).

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Sec. 8. RCW 10.77.065 and 2014 c 10 s 3 are each amended to read as follows:

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- (1)(a)(i) The expert conducting the evaluation shall provide his or her report and recommendation to the court in which the criminal proceeding is pending. For a competency evaluation of a defendant who is released from custody, if the evaluation cannot be completed within twenty-one days due to a lack of cooperation by the defendant, the evaluator shall notify the court that he or she is unable to complete the evaluation because of such lack of cooperation.
- (ii) A copy of the report and recommendation shall be provided to the designated mental health professional, the prosecuting attorney, the defense attorney, and the professional person at the local correctional facility where the defendant is being held, or if there is no professional person, to the person designated under (a)(iv) of this subsection. Upon request, the evaluator shall also provide copies of any source documents relevant to the evaluation to the designated mental health professional.
- (iii) Any facility providing inpatient services related to competency shall discharge the defendant as soon as the facility determines that the defendant is competent to stand trial. Discharge shall not be postponed during the writing and distribution of the evaluation report. Distribution of an evaluation report by a facility providing inpatient services shall ordinarily be accomplished within two working days or less following the final evaluation of the defendant. If the defendant is discharged to the custody of a local correctional facility, the local correctional facility must continue the medication regimen prescribed by the facility, when clinically appropriate, unless the defendant refuses to cooperate medication and an involuntary medication order by the court has not been entered.
- (iv) If there is no professional person at the local correctional facility, the local correctional facility shall designate a professional person as defined in RCW 71.05.020 or, in cooperation with the regional support network, a professional person at the regional support network to receive the report and recommendation.
- (v) Upon commencement of a defendant's evaluation in the local correctional facility, the local correctional facility must notify the evaluator of the name of the professional person, or person designated under (a)(iv) of this subsection, to receive the report and recommendation.

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(b) If the evaluator concludes, under RCW 10.77.060(3)(f), the person should be evaluated by a designated mental health professional under chapter 71.05 RCW, the court shall order such evaluation be conducted prior to release from confinement when the person is acquitted or convicted and sentenced to confinement for twenty-four months or less, or when charges are dismissed pursuant to a finding of incompetent to stand trial.

- (2) The designated mental health professional shall provide written notification within twenty-four hours of the results of the determination whether to commence proceedings under chapter 71.05 RCW. The notification shall be provided to the persons identified in subsection (1)(a) of this section.
- (3) The prosecuting attorney shall provide a copy of the results of any proceedings commenced by the designated mental health professional under subsection (2) of this section to the secretary.
- (4) A facility conducting a civil commitment evaluation under RCW 10.77.086(4) or  $10.77.088(1)((\frac{b}{b}))$  (c)(ii) that makes a determination to release the person instead of filing a civil commitment petition must provide written notice to the prosecutor and defense attorney at least twenty-four hours prior to release. The notice may be given by electronic mail, facsimile, or other means reasonably likely to communicate the information immediately.
- (5) The fact of admission and all information and records compiled, obtained, or maintained in the course of providing services under this chapter may also be disclosed to the courts solely to prevent the entry of any evaluation or treatment order that is inconsistent with any order entered under chapter 71.05 RCW.
- **Sec. 9.** RCW 10.77.065 and 2014 c 225 s 59 and 2014 c 10 s 3 are 29 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:
  - (1)(a)(i) The expert conducting the evaluation shall provide his or her report and recommendation to the court in which the criminal proceeding is pending. For a competency evaluation of a defendant who is released from custody, if the evaluation cannot be completed within twenty-one days due to a lack of cooperation by the defendant, the evaluator shall notify the court that he or she is unable to complete the evaluation because of such lack of cooperation.
- (ii) A copy of the report and recommendation shall be provided to the designated mental health professional, the prosecuting attorney, the defense attorney, and the professional person at the local

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correctional facility where the defendant is being held, or if there is no professional person, to the person designated under (a)(iv) of this subsection. Upon request, the evaluator shall also provide copies of any source documents relevant to the evaluation to the designated mental health professional.

- (iii) Any facility providing inpatient services related to competency shall discharge the defendant as soon as the facility determines that the defendant is competent to stand trial. Discharge shall not be postponed during the writing and distribution of the evaluation report. Distribution of an evaluation report by a facility providing inpatient services shall ordinarily be accomplished within two working days or less following the final evaluation of the defendant. If the defendant is discharged to the custody of a local correctional facility, the local correctional facility must continue the medication regimen prescribed by the facility, when clinically appropriate, unless the defendant refuses to cooperate medication and an involuntary medication order by the court has not been entered.
  - (iv) If there is no professional person at the local correctional facility, the local correctional facility shall designate a professional person as defined in RCW 71.05.020 or, in cooperation with the behavioral health organization, a professional person at the behavioral health organization to receive the report and recommendation.
  - (v) Upon commencement of a defendant's evaluation in the local correctional facility, the local correctional facility must notify the evaluator of the name of the professional person, or person designated under (a)(iv) of this subsection, to receive the report and recommendation.
  - (b) If the evaluator concludes, under RCW 10.77.060(3)(f), the person should be evaluated by a designated mental health professional under chapter 71.05 RCW, the court shall order such evaluation be conducted prior to release from confinement when the person is acquitted or convicted and sentenced to confinement for twenty-four months or less, or when charges are dismissed pursuant to a finding of incompetent to stand trial.
  - (2) The designated mental health professional shall provide written notification within twenty-four hours of the results of the determination whether to commence proceedings under chapter 71.05

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1 RCW. The notification shall be provided to the persons identified in subsection (1)(a) of this section.

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- (3) The prosecuting attorney shall provide a copy of the results of any proceedings commenced by the designated mental health professional under subsection (2) of this section to the secretary.
- 6 (4) A facility conducting a civil commitment evaluation under RCW  $10.77.088(1)((\frac{b}{b}))$ 7 10.77.086(4) (c)(ii) that or makes determination to release the person instead of filing a civil 8 commitment petition must provide written notice to the prosecutor and 9 defense attorney at least twenty-four hours prior to release. The 10 notice may be given by electronic mail, facsimile, or other means 11 12 reasonably likely to communicate the information immediately.
- 13 (5) The fact of admission and all information and records 14 compiled, obtained, or maintained in the course of providing services 15 under this chapter may also be disclosed to the courts solely to 16 prevent the entry of any evaluation or treatment order that is 17 inconsistent with any order entered under chapter 71.05 RCW.
